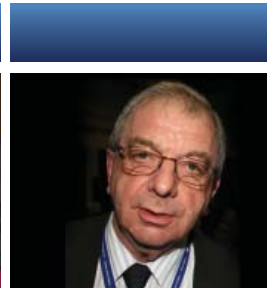

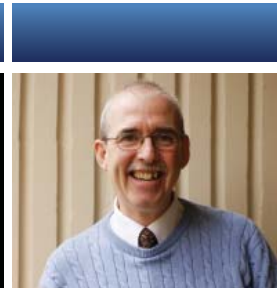

Our Member Support and Services

Our Awards

The **Prix H.H. Stern Award**, established to encourage innovations in the classroom, school, and community was presented to Monique Myers, a Core French teacher at Wawota Parkland School (Saskatchewan). She and two of her students participated in the National Forum hosted by SEVEC and subsequently hosted a regional forum on bilingualism for their school and others in their school division. Her students then set up a six-step action plan to make their community more bilingual-friendly.



The **Prix Robert Roy Award** was presented to CASLT Past President Jim Howden, a recognized leader in co-operative learning and ESL education in Quebec. He has developed and conducted over 3,000 workshops and keynote addresses on co-operative, small-group learning, effective learning, conflict resolution, classroom management, cognitive psychology, and creating a culture of collaboration within a school team. For many years, Jim was also the editor of CASLT's *Réflexions* magazine.



The **Honorary Lifetime Member Award** was presented to The Honourable Claudette Tardif, Senator, Alberta. She has been a second language teacher, dean of the Faculté St-Jean at the University of Alberta, and author of numerous works in the fields of immersion education and teacher training. Senator Tardif is one of Canada's foremost advocate and defender of minority linguistic and cultural rights.



Our Teacher Bursaries

CASLT created a bursary fund to increase accessibility for second language teachers requiring financial assistance to participate in quality professional development opportunities in order to enhance their teaching practice, linguistic skills, and cultural knowledge.

Congratulations to the first CASLT Teacher Bursary recipients 2008: Christine Mink, Owen Sound, ON; Maria Carmen Romero, Toronto, ON; Roxanna Smycniuk, Saskatoon, SK; and Amira Younis, Mississauga, ON. All four attended the CASLT/OLBI Summer University for FSL Teachers held at the University of Ottawa in July 2008.

Our Progress

CASLT has defined a clear sense of purpose and vision, key strategic directions, and areas of priority. CASLT has developed processes to attain meaningful results in five major strategic areas in order to solidify its leadership capacity in support of effective second and additional language teaching and learning in Canada:

- Member support and services
- Research development and dissemination
- Networking and partnerships
- Public awareness, media, and government relations
- Organizational capacity

Our Projects

a. FSL and ESL Teacher and Program Support

- Launched our new look for *Réflexions*, our member magazine, including new features such as an “Ask an Expert” column, new support resources, and new services for our members.
- Increased access to quality web-based resources on our Web site and in our monthly online newsletters, including a new online boutique, RSS feed, and monthly member polls. A Core French bibliography 1986–2007 (searchable online database) was posted for member use.
- Supported a research-based PD colloquium hosted by CCERBAL, University of Ottawa, entitled “Bilingualism in a Plurilingual Canada: Research and Implications,” June 19 and 20, 2008. CASLT produced and posted a series of video clips and podcasts with fact sheets from this event.
- In partnership with OLBI, delivered a new PD opportunity: a ten-day Summer University for FSL Teachers, University of Ottawa, July 2008.
- Released the Research Report, *The Relative Effectiveness of Different FSL Delivery Models, Review of Research*, C. Mady, Principal Investigator, September 2008.

b. Common Framework and Portfolio for Languages for Canada

- Delivered a two-day Symposium on the Utilization of the CEFR and ELP in Canada with invited guest speaker, David Little, Trinity College Dublin, Ireland. The event was held in three locations: Fredericton, NB; Edmonton, AB; and Ottawa, ON. Marnie Beaudoin, IISLE (Edmonton Public Schools), presented an update on the Edmonton implementation experience and practical strategies for getting started.
- Updated the Common Framework of Reference and Portfolio for Languages in Canada Information Toolkit, second edition, with elements of the Symposium sessions.

A review of CASLT’s guiding principles was conducted in order to ensure that the association represents and includes all language teachers, thereby exemplifying the plurilingual nature of Canada and Canadians. An amendment to Section 3 of the CASLT constitutional documents came into effect in fall 2008, removing restrictions related to National Council, and allowing policy and procedures to govern the workings and number of representatives of the National Council as the organization grows and diversifies. An additional meeting of the National Council enabled our representatives to network and complete their action planning for the 2008–2009 school year. A partnership agreement was formalized with the Institute for Innovation in Second Language Education (IISLE) of Edmonton Public Schools.

- Established a committee to explore the need and use of a language portfolio with teacher candidates enrolled in faculty of education programs. A draft tool was developed in spring 2009 and a process of field-testing the document is underway in school year 2009–2010.
- Offered more in depth PD sessions to teachers and administrators focused on current trends in L2 education, including the CEFR and ELP initiative.

c. LangCanada Web site Portal

- Managed, maintained, and marketed the Web site to increase use of the educational resources database among second language teachers, and increase awareness of the newly-developed learning opportunities inventories.

d. “Francophonie canadienne” documentary, video clips, and teaching guide in partnership with TV5 Québec-Canada & FIPF Québec, 2008

- Variations francophones, a teacher resource of 12 video clips and teaching guide was released during the XII^e World Congress of the Fédération internationale des professeurs de français (FIPF) held in Quebec City, July 2008.

e. Language Associations and Collaborative Supports (LACS) with the European Centre for Modern Languages (ECML), Graz, Austria

- Participation on a multinational and multilingual (French, German, and English) project committee with the goals of facilitating greater collaboration between language association networks and disseminating ECML publications.

f. International Languages Teacher and Program Support

- Development of communication listservs for teachers of specific target languages.
- Planning and preparations for the first National Conference for Second Language Educators, Languages Without Borders, in partnership with the Institute for Innovation in Second Language Education (IISLE), Edmonton, May 21–23, 2009.

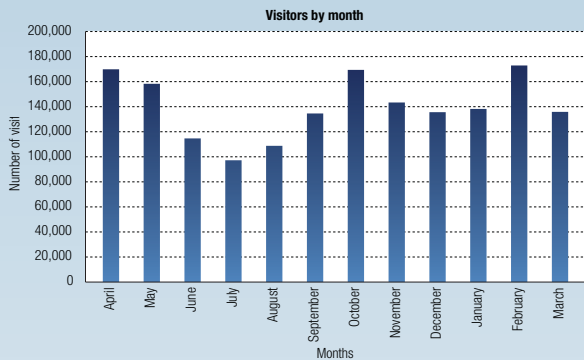

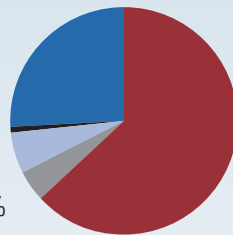

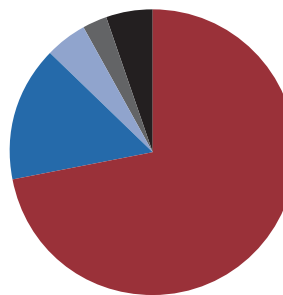

Statement of Changes in Net Assets

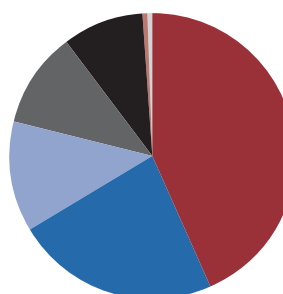

Our Monthly Highlights

April 16–17, 2008

Two one-day **CASLT Chez Vous** events were held in Regina and Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, focusing on using literacy and assessment for learning strategies to develop oral communication and reading skills in L2 classrooms.

May 1–2, 2008

CASLT **Symposium on the Utilization of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR) and the European Language Portfolio (ELP) in Canada** with invited speaker David Little, of Trinity College, Ireland, was held in three locations.



June 19–20, 2008

CASLT provided support for the CCERBAL (University of Ottawa) Colloquium, **Bilingualism in a Plurilingual Canada: Research and Implications** with invited speaker, Joseph Shiels, of the Language Policy Division of the Council of Europe.



July 7–18, 2008

The first ten-day **CASLT/OLBI Summer University for FSL Teachers** (Core French, Intensive French, and French Immersion) was held at the University of Ottawa, with a focus on technology and culture in the L2 classroom.



July 21–25, 2008

CASLT participated in the **XII^e FIPF World Congress**, *Faire vivre les identités francophones*, held in Quebec City. CASLT staffed an exhibitor table, presented four workshop sessions, and launched its new teacher resource, *Variations francophones*.

August 23–24, 2008

While meeting in St. John's, Newfoundland, the CASLT Board of Directors met with **Friend of CASLT**, The Honourable John Crosbie, Lieutenant Governor of Newfoundland and Labrador, and held a **CASLT Members Meet and Greet**.



September 25–26, 2008

The **CASLT AGM and Networking Event** was held in Vancouver, BC, with an address by Graham Fraser, Commissioner of Official Languages. The Networking Event focused on fuelling positive change in L2 and creating a "Roadmap" for Core French.



October 1, 2008

BCATML/CASLT PD Day for University of British Columbia and Simon Fraser University: welcomed 85 teacher candidates from both universities' FSL cohorts (elementary and secondary) to take part in PD sessions, and learn about their provincial and national language associations.

November 13–15, 2008

CASLT participated in language partner events such as the **SPEAQ Annual Conference**, *Reaching Out for Success*, by staffing an exhibitor table and presenting workshops.

December 15, 2008

CASLT posted its long awaited **Core and Intensive French Research Bibliography** to its Web site. The searchable database of over 290 entries spans 1986 to 2007 and will be updated annually.

January 5, 2009

CASLT posted the first of a series of 20 **research-based video clips** along with accompanying slide shows as a reference for teachers on applying research into classroom practices.

February 20–21, 2009

CASLT was invited to present workshop sessions at the **Fête de la culture française**, organized by Grand Valley State University (GVSU), Grand Rapids, Michigan Chapter.

March 6–22, 2009

CASLT proudly encouraged FSL participation in the **Rendez-vous de la Francophonie**, by supporting the development of a FSL insert, which was included in the event's annual newspaper circular and disseminated to over 3,000 members.

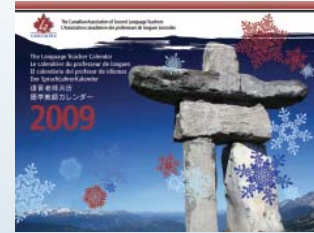
