This workshop facilitator guide provides training materials and processes for inservice and preservice teachers to support the use of the Language Portfolio in French as a Second Language (FSL) primary and secondary levels. This facilitator guide describes a sequence of activities designed to support teachers in learning more about the Language Portfolio within an FSL context. The activities have been grouped into topic areas (for example, *Getting to Know the Language Portfolio*). The activities can be presented in a variety of formats ranging from a full day workshop to short, individual training sessions pertaining to a particular topic area presented over time, depending on participants' needs and time availability. The workshop can be delivered in a variety of formats, including in-person and online.

Facilitators may choose to adapt workshop activities in order to meet the needs and interests of those with whom they are working, as well as to align with the timelines of the format of workshop chosen.

Slide #1

Using the Language Portfolio in the Classroom

- Display this slide while participants are getting settled as it provides information regarding the session and ensures that participants understand that this presentation was developed by the Canadian Association of Second Language Teachers (CASLT).
- 2. Welcome participants and briefly introduce yourself.
- 3. If appropriate, share some information about CASLT, its purpose and resources, and how it can support second language teachers. Consider exploring CASLT's website with participants: www.caslt.org
- 4. Share background about the Language Portfolio workshop with participants:
 - CASLT issued a request for proposals in July 2015 to develop a workshop and training session around the use of the Language Portfolio in the classroom.
 - The Institute for Innovation in Second Language Education (IISLE) at Edmonton Public Schools was awarded the contract to develop this workshop for CASLT.

What is the CEFR?

[show slide #11]

- 1. This slide relates to agenda item #3.
- Explain to participants that they will now view the first part of a CASLT video that talks about the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR) and the Language Portfolio.
- 3. Ask participants through a show of hands who has heard of the CEFR to give you an idea of how much time you might need for discussion after viewing the video.
- 4. Give participants time to first jot down keywords and phrases in the *CEFR K-W-L-Q Chart* handout. Invite them to refer to the video word bank on the handout to stimulate their thinking.
- 5. View up to 1:30 of the video, *What is the CEFR*? This segment ends after mention of the Language Portfolio and alerts participants to the link between the CEFR and the Language Portfolio.
- 6. Allow participants time to finish their K-W-L-Q chart to note what they have learned about the CEFR, what questions they might still have, and what new questions they may have from watching the video.
- 7. Ask participants to share their thoughts on the CEFR video with another participant with whom they have not yet worked.
- 8. Use the next slide as a group debrief.

Tips

You may choose to show the complete video, *What is the CEFR?* to introduce the Language Portfolio, depending on time and background of the workshop participants. If you do, inform participants that for this part of the workshop, activities will focus on the CEFR. Tell them that they will have an opportunity to rewatch the video later in the workshop (slide #29) when activities focus on the Language Portfolio.
